### Overview of the post

Applications are invited for the post of University Lecturer in Computer Science (Foundations) with effect from 1 October 2012 or as soon as possible thereafter. The successful candidate will also be appointed to a Non-Tutorial Fellowship at Wolfson College.

The successful candidate will join the thriving Foundations research theme in the Department of Computer Science, and will be expected to conduct research of an internationally recognised standard in the area of this research theme. The Department has been a leading force in the foundations of computer science since the seminal work of Scott and Strachey in the 1970's. The Foundations theme is led by Professor Samson Abramsky FRS. It has conducted ground breaking work in a number of topics, including game semantics and its applications to verification, categorical quantum mechanics and applications of diagrammatic reasoning to quantum information, and compositional distributional models of meaning in natural language. Major topics of current research include quantum information and foundations, semantics and logics of computation, semantics-based verification, computational logic and automated tool support for diagrammatic reasoning, computational linguistics and natural language semantics, epistemic game theory and rational interaction.

This will be the fourth computer science fellowship at Wolfson College (where Abramsky, Professor Bob Coecke and Dr Geraint Jones are already fellows) and the third in Foundations.

### Duties of the post

The University Lecturer will be a member of both the University and the College community. He or she will be part of a lively and intellectually stimulating research community which performs to the highest international levels in research and publications and will have access to the excellent research facilities which Oxford offers. He or she will have a role to play in the running of the College as a member and trustee of its Governing Body.

The main duties of the post are as follows:

#### *Research*

- to engage in original research in computer science in an area relevant to the Foundations theme;
- to secure research funding and engage in the management of research projects;
- to disseminate his/her research through publication in scholarly journals, participation in international conferences and seminars, and through other media;
- to engage in knowledge transfer activities.

#### *Teaching*

- to carry out teaching at undergraduate and graduate level including lectures, classes, demonstrations, and project supervision, under the direction of the Head of Department;
- to supervise research students.
- to undertake additional duties which are broadly equivalent to the teaching stint of six hours per week during full term undertaken by those University Lecturers who are Tutorial Fellows of colleges. These duties which may, for example, be undergraduate or graduate teaching, will be under the direction of the Head of Department, who may in some cases assign some or all of them to one or more colleges.

#### *Examining*

- to take part in University examining as and when requested to do so;

#### *Administration*

- to participate in the administration of the department as and when requested by the Head of Department;
- to take part in the administration and governance of the College by participation in the Governing Body and other committees.

## **Person specification**

Applications will be judged only against the criteria which are set out below. Applicants should make sure that their application shows very clearly how they believe that their skills and experience meet these criteria.

Oxford is committed to fairness, consistency and transparency in selection decisions, and unsuccessful applicants may request feedback against the published selection criteria for the specific post. (We are, however, unable to provide general advice about the suitability of applicants' cvs for future vacancies in Oxford or elsewhere.) Chairs of selection committees will be aware of the principles of equality of opportunity and fair selection and there will be a member of each gender wherever possible.

The successful candidate will be expected to carry out internationally recognised research in Foundations. Applications are welcome from candidates working in any area of Foundations but are particularly encouraged from people working in any of quantum information and foundations, semantics and logics of computation, applications of category theory to computer science, semantics-based verification, computational logic and automated tool support, foundational aspects of computational linguistics and natural language semantics, epistemic game theory and rational interaction.

The successful candidate will demonstrate the following:

### *Essential*

- (a) A doctorate in an appropriate field;
- (b) Proven post-doctoral research record of high quality at international level;
- (c) Ability to attract research funding and develop an independent programme of research;
- (d) Experience of and ability to teach effectively, both at undergraduate and graduate level, a wide range of topics within the field of computer science;
- (e) Ability to supervise graduate students;
- (f) Excellent interpersonal skills necessary for undertaking teaching at both undergraduate and graduate level and the pastoral care of students;
- (g) Ability and willingness to undertake the full range of administrative duties both within the department and the College.
- (h) Ability to contribute to course development, including but not restricted to their area of specialisation.

### *Desirable*

- (i) Excellent track record of obtaining research grants;
- (j) Experience of research collaborations at national and international level;
- (k) Experience of supervising research students;
- (l) Good communication and organisational skills.

## **How to apply**

There is no application form. Applications must include:

- your full contact details including email and full postal addresses, and a telephone number;
- a covering letter or statement (clearly stating the post title) explaining how you meet the criteria set out above;
- a full CV and publications list; details of teaching experience including a description of teaching approach, and a statement of research interests;
- an indication of where you first heard about this post;
- the names and contact details (postal and e-mail addresses and telephone number) of **three** referees.

You should contact all three of your referees (not more than two of whom should be from the same institution) before applying, to ensure they are aware of your application and of the requirements for the post, and to ensure that they are willing to provide a reference for you for this post.

Applications for this post will be considered by a selection committee containing representatives from both the Department of Computer Science and Wolfson College. The selection committee is responsible for conducting all aspects of the recruitment and selection process; it does not, however, have the authority to make the final decision as to who should be appointed. The final decision will be made by the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences divisional board and the governing body of Wolfson College on the basis of a recommendation made by the selection committee. No offer of appointment will be valid, therefore, until and unless the recommendation has been approved by both the divisional board and the governing body, and a formal contractual offer has been made.

All applications will be acknowledged after receipt and will be considered by the selection committee as soon as possible after the closing date. Candidates short-listed for the post will be interviewed by the selection committee and will be invited to give a short lecture of about twenty-five minutes' duration on their research interests. The lecture should be designed for a general audience of computer scientists and should be based on some aspect of the candidates' own research. It is planned to hold interviews for this position in the week commencing Monday 27<sup>th</sup> February 2012.

## The University

## The Mathematical, Physical, and Life Sciences Division

The Mathematical, Physical, and Life Sciences Division (MPLS) is one of the four academic divisions of the University. Oxford is widely recognised as one of the world's leading science universities. In the 2008 UK Research Assessment Exercise over 70% of research activity in MPLS was judged to be world-leading (4\*) or internationally excellent (3\*), and Oxford was ranked first in the UK across the mathematical sciences as a whole.

The MPLS division's ten departments and three interdisciplinary units span the full spectrum of the mathematical, computational, physical, engineering and life sciences, and undertake both fundamental research and cutting-edge applied work. We have over 6,000 students and research staff, and generate over half of our funding from external research grants. Our research addresses major societal and technological challenges and is increasingly interdisciplinary in nature. We collaborate closely with colleagues in Oxford across the medical sciences, social sciences and humanities, as well as with researchers from around the world.

## The Department of Computer Science

The Department of Computer Science, called the Computing Laboratory until June 2011, was originally established in 1957. It is one of the UK's leading Computer Science Departments (ranked first in a number of newspaper rankings, and third in terms of research power). In the RAE in 2008, 80% of the submitted research was found to be in the top two tiers, either 4\* (world-leading) or 3\* (internationally excellent). Many members of the Department are active in externally sponsored research, with both government and industrial funding. At present there are 48 members of academic staff and over 80 research staff.

The department has close links with government, industry, and other departments within the University. Among the latter are Mathematics, Engineering, Physics and a number of life sciences departments. It has a major role in the rapidly-developing field of e-Science, an essentially interdisciplinary activity which is at present attracting major funding from a number of sources. At present it holds £37m in external research contracts.

Currently, research in the department is managed in seven themes following a recent realignment and expansion of previous groups. *Computational Biology* (led by Professor David Gavaghan, and including Professors Kevin Burrage and Helen Byrne) is one of the world's leading groups building computational models of biological systems; *Foundations, Logic and Structures*, (leader, Professor Samson Abramsky) which includes groups working on quantum information and computation (Professor Abramsky and Professor Bob Coecke), game semantics and verification (Professor Luke Ong) and constraints (Professor Peter Jeavons); *Information Systems* (jointly led by Professors Georg Gottlob and Ian Horrocks) including Professor Stephen Pulman (Computational Linguistics); *Programming Languages* (led by Professor Oege de Moor); *Verification* (leader Professor Marta Kwiatkowska) covering probabilistic and software model checking, with concurrency (Professor Bill Roscoe and Professor Gavin Lowe), and automated verification of hardware (Professor Tom Melham); and *Software Engineering* (Professor Jim Davies). Software Engineering, together with Computational Biology, provides the main focus of the department's work on e-Science. A *Security* theme is currently being established (under the leadership of Professor Bill Roscoe), with academic staff from the Software Engineering and Verification themes, plus other new appointments including the establishment of a Cybersecurity Centre.

## Wolfson College

There are 38 self-governing and independent colleges at Oxford, giving both academic staff and students the benefits of belonging to a small, interdisciplinary community as well as to a large, internationally-renowned institution. The collegiate system fosters a strong sense of community, bringing together leading academics and students across subjects, and from different cultures and countries.

Wolfson is the largest graduate college in the university. There are approximately 550 graduate students and 136 fellows, including about 60 Official Fellows who are all members of the College's Governing Body, and Trustees of the College under Charity Law.

The college admits approximately 180 Students a year to study for postgraduate degrees and diplomas of the university: there is no restriction on subject. Unlike most Undergraduates, who are taught by their college, graduate students are taught by their Department or Faculty and so no fellow has specified teaching duties for Wolfson. Fellows do, however, teach undergraduates by arrangement with their colleges. Fellows also teach and supervise Graduates, who may be students of any college, including Wolfson.

There is a single Common Room for all fellows and students, which is shared with a large community of Members of Common Room and Visitors. All Governing Body Fellows are Members of Common Room.

A Governing Body Fellowship at Wolfson currently carries no additional stipend but all Fellows are entitled to various allowances such as for Common Table (an allowance covering lunch and dinner during the week and weekly Guest Nights, up to a fixed maximum), entertainment and some financial support for travel and academic purposes. Governing Body Fellows are also given priority in the allocation of residential accommodation.

The allowances and duties of Governing Body Fellows are reviewed regularly by Governing Body. Currently, the duties of a Governing Body Fellow are:

- to attend Governing Body Meetings held twice a term;
- to assist with the governance of the college by serving upon one or more of the committees of Governing Body;
- to act as College Advisor to a number of Wolfson students, meeting them on arrival and at least once a term thereafter, to offer pastoral advice and support.

A Governing Body Fellowship is subject to renewal every seven years.

## Standard Terms and Conditions

### *Salary, benefits and pension*

The successful candidate will be appointed on the Oxford scale for university lecturers (the combined University and College salary being in the range of £42,733 - £57,431). Lecturers appointed below the top of this range will receive annual increments until they reach the top point. There is also an annual 'cost-of-living' review. Departments may also, in wholly exceptional cases, propose the awarding within the substantive scale of additional increments to lecturers at any time during their appointment.

Additional remuneration is currently paid to those undertaking examining and graduate supervision.

### *Length of appointment*

Upon completion of an initial period of appointment (which is normally five years), a university lecturer is eligible for reappointment until retiring age, subject to the provisions of the Statutes and Regulations of the University. Evidence of lecturing competence and of substantial progress in research are prerequisites for reappointment to the retiring age.

For all academic and academic-related staff the University has adopted a retirement age of 30 September before the 68th birthday. There is a procedure for requesting an extension of employment beyond that date.

### *Sabbatical leave and outside commitments*

All lecturers may apply for sabbatical leave to allow them to focus on their research. In general, one term of leave is available for each six terms worked. This leave may either be taken as one term of leave after 6 terms of service, or accumulated and taken as one year of leave after 6 years of service.

Lecturers may also spend up to 30 working days in each year on projects outside their employment duties, such as consultancy, spin-out activity and membership of research councils and other bodies. There is no limit to the amount of money which staff may earn from these activities. The appointment will be subject to the satisfactory completion of a medical questionnaire and the provision of proof of the right to work in the UK.

Applicants who would need a work visa if appointed to the post are asked to note that under the UK's points-based migration system they will need to demonstrate that they have sufficient points, and in particular that:

- (i) they have sufficient English language skills (evidenced by having passed a test in English, or coming from a majority English-speaking country, or having taken a degree taught in English)

and

- (ii) that they have sufficient funds to maintain themselves and any dependents until they receive their first salary payment.
